SCHOLARSHIP AND FELLOWSHIP SUMMARY

Students with strong academic records and significant extracurricular involvement are invited to apply for a number of prestigious scholarships and fellowships. These awards provide the recipient with an opportunity to study in a world-class university or challenging professional environment at home or overseas. In some cases, partial tuition support for your undergraduate education is provided.

Below are brief descriptions of the awards; further information can be found in the scholarship office of the Emory College Office for Undergraduate Education.

There are three categories of awards:

1. National scholarships requiring institutional endorsement. Applications are reviewed first by an Emory committee, with a certain number endorsed and sent on to the award granting organization for the next round in the selection process; students cannot apply directly, but must go through Emory.
2. National scholarships with no institutional endorsement. Applicants send their materials directly to the scholarship agency, with no preliminary selection by Emory.
3. Internal scholarships. These awards are open to Emory students only.

The Beinecke Scholarship supports graduate study leading to a PhD in the arts, humanities, or social sciences. Applicants must demonstrate a superior record of intellectual ability, scholastic achievement and personal promise, as well as financial need. Funding is granted for up to five years of graduate study, with a small grant to the recipient during senior year to use as he or she sees fit.

The Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, located in Washington, D.C., is a private, nonprofit organization dedicated to advancing cooperation between nations. Their goal is to provide international affairs work experience in the areas of research, publishing, and education. Up to ten one-year fellowships are awarded annually, with a monthly salary provided by the Carnegie program. United States citizenship is not required, but you must be eligible to work in the U.S.

The scholarship is renewable each year for the duration of your graduate studies as long as you continue to meet eligibility requirements. The Jack Kent Cooke Foundation seeks those who demonstrate academic excellence, financial need, leadership qualities, and the potential to make a significant contribution to your field and/or society. International students are eligible to apply.

The U.S. Fulbright Program is designed to give recent B.A./B.S. graduates, students enrolled in masters or doctoral programs, and young professionals and artists opportunities for personal development, intellectual, professional and artistic growth and international experience. Fulbright Fellows receive full grants, travel grants, and/or teaching assistantships which allow them to pursue one academic year of self designed study and/or research in a foreign country.

The Goldwater Scholarship was founded to foster excellence in science and mathematics at the undergraduate level. Sophomores are eligible for two years of support; juniors are eligible for one. U.S. citizens who have demonstrated outstanding potential for and commitment to a career in mathematics, the natural sciences, and some fields of engineering may apply. Students' ultimate educational goal should be the Ph.D. Students seeking clinical M.D. degrees are not eligible.

The award provides for a year's experience in Asia in an internship arranged individually for each Scholar, based on his or her specific interests, background, and qualifications. The program is designed to give young leaders with no prior experience of Asia a chance to become acquainted with Asia and their Asian counterparts. Applicants must be U.S. citizens under 30 years of age, be able to show clear leadership in their chosen field, and may NOT have a professed career interest in Asian Affairs or have had any significant exposure to Asia.

The Marshall Scholarship funds two years of study at the University of your choice in the United Kingdom. Selection committees look for distinction of intellect and character. Preference is given to candidates who combine high academic ability with the capacity to play an active part in the life of the university they choose to attend and who display a potential to make a significant contribution to their own society. Applicants must have a minimum GPA of 3.7 and be U.S. citizens under the age of 26.

Mitchell scholars must demonstrate intellectual distinction, a record of leadership, involvement in extracurricular activity and service to others, and potential for future leadership. Finalists will be interviewed in Washington, DC in November.

If you are not a U.S. citizen, you may be eligible to apply through your own country.

The David L. Boren Fellowship, administered by the National Security Education Program, supports students pursuing the study of languages, cultures, and world regions that are critical to U.S. national security but are less frequently studied by U.S. graduate students, i.e., areas of the world other than Western Europe, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand. Fellowships provide support for overseas or domestic study, or a combination of both. The maximum award for overseas study is \$10,000 per semester for up to two semesters. A maximum of \$12,000 is available for a program of domestic study only. The maximum level of support for a combined overseas and domestic program is \$28,000. The fellowship requires a service agreement with a government agency or office of national security that is approximately equal to the period of time an award recipient is supported by the program, but usually not less than one year. Primary selection factors are academic excellence, submission of a workable proposal, intent to develop and/or advance non-native language competence, ability to adapt to different cultures, and the integration of your proposal into your academic field and career goals. You must be enrolled in graduate school upon receipt of the award. Download an application or call 800-498-9360 to request an application.

The Ford Foundation supports individuals in pursuit of a research-based PhD in the following fields: behavioral sciences, humanities, social sciences, life sciences, chemistry, earth sciences, physics and astronomy, engineering, mathematics, and computer science. Approximately 60 Pre-doctoral Fellowships and 35 Dissertation Fellowships are awarded annually in a competition conducted by the National Research Council.

The Pre-doctoral Fellowship is intended for students at or near the beginning of doctoral study. It is tenable for three years at any accredited U.S. institution of higher education, provides an annual stipend of approximately \$16,000 along with an annual grant of approximately \$7,500 to the fellowship institution to be accepted in lieu of tuition and fees.

The Dissertation Fellowship, which is intended for students who have completed all departmental and institutional requirements except for the writing and defense of the dissertation, provides a stipend of approximately \$21,000, and is tenable for 9 to 12 months.

The fellowship program is funded by the United States Department of State and administered by the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation (WWNFF). It seeks to recruit talented students in academic programs relevant to international affairs, political and economic analysis, management, administration, and science policy who have an interest in pursuing a Foreign Service career in the U.S. Department of State.

The fellowship award includes tuition, room, board, and mandatory fees during the junior and senior years of college and during the first year of graduate study, with reimbursement for books and one round-trip travel. The Fellow must commit to pursuing a graduate degree in international studies at one of the graduate schools identified by the WWNFF. Participating graduate schools provide financial support in the second year of graduate study based on need. Fellows meet annually in Washington, DC, for a program orientation, attend a junior year summer institute, and participate in two summer internships. Recipients enter into a CONTRACTUAL AGREEMENT obligating them to a minimum of four and one half years service in an appointment as a Foreign Service Officer upon completion of the graduate degree.

College graduates are eligible to apply for the Graduate Foreign Affairs Fellowship. See website for funding information. A three year commitment as a Foreign Service Officer is required.

The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and the University of Cambridge have established the Gates Cambridge Scholarship for graduate study at Cambridge University in order to assist future leaders who not only excel academically, but also have a commitment or vision to improve the lives of others. The Trust looks for students of exceptional academic achievement and scholarly promise for whom advanced study at Cambridge would be particularly appropriate. The scholarship covers University fees and additional monies for expenses. Admission to the University of Cambridge is required to accept the award, so applicants must meet the academic criteria for admission specified by the University. All academic disciplines are eligible to apply. U.S. citizenship is not required.

Study Scholarships are awarded to qualified graduating seniors and graduate students of all disciplines to provide the opportunity to study in Germany, or complete a postgraduate or Master's degree course and obtain a degree from a German higher education institution. This scholarship provides funds for study and/or research in Germany for an academic year (October 1 to July 31). Students may be from any major, but should have a good command of German. Applicants are requested to have a well-defined study project that makes a stay in Germany essential. Preference will be given to applicants who have been invited by a faculty member at a German university to study at a particular university department. Graduating seniors applying for this program must be enrolled full-time at an accredited university at the time of application.

The Alexander von Humboldt Foundation offers the German Chancellor Scholarship. The scholarship was designed to strengthen U.S. and German ties by providing individuals the opportunity to live one year in Germany. Applicants design individual projects tailored to their development, study, or research. The command of German is not a prerequisite for application. Scholars with little or no prior knowledge

of German are asked to begin language training in the U.S. upon accepting the scholarship and to arrive in Germany in August to continue intensive, specialized German language instruction. The program begins September 1st and lasts for twelve months. The scholarship stipend consists of a monthly allowance to cover housing and living expenses, travel expenses to and from Germany, and costs of a German language course, introductory seminar, study tour, and final meeting in Bonn. HIA programs are designed to promote and facilitate an ongoing trans-Atlantic dialogue about the challenges that democratic societies encounter as they experience new degrees and forms of diversity. The goal is to reinforce the HIA Fellows' commitment to democratic values and human rights; to encourage American and European students to become leaders in these fields; and to foster a growing international community bound together by these commitments. HIA offers two Summer Core Programs: the European Summer Core Programs on diversity and democracy in Denmark, France, Germany, The Netherlands, and Poland; and the American Summer Core Program on diversity in America, held in New York. During the core program, the Fellows will develop plans for engaging human rights or minority issues in their home institutions or communities. After the core program, HIA supports Fellows' continuing involvement in minority and human rights issues through prestigious national and international internships, a trans-Atlantic professional network, and Senior Fellows Associations in the United States and Europe. Each fellowship is worth up to \$200,000, depending on the university the Fellow attends. Fellows receive tuition, fees and research stipends for up to six years and two paid summer internships at their NPSC sponsored employer's research facility.

The Soros Foundation funds up to two years of graduate study in any field at any university in the United States. A Soros fellow must be a new immigrant (holder of a Green card or naturalized citizen) or the child of two naturalized citizen parents. Candidates must be under 30 years old. Thirty fellowships are awarded annually, providing one-half tuition cost and a stipend of \$20,000. Successful candidates give evidence of two of the following three attributes: 1) creativity, originality, and initiative in any area of a candidate's life; 2) a commitment to and capacity for accomplishment; 3) a commitment to the values expressed in the U.S. Constitution and Bill of Rights.

Current recipients of Liberal Arts Scholarships are eligible to apply and may add the DAS to their existing award. Students currently receiving half tuition or larger merit-based awards or courtesy scholarships will not receive additional support from the DAS, but can become Emory Scholars through this award. The DAS normally replaces loan support for students receiving need-based awards. Applications are available in 300 White Hall.

Candidates should demonstrate (1) significant leadership; (2) intellectual excellence; (3) excellent speaking and writing ability; (4) strong interpersonal skills. The university has faculties of arts, sciences, and divinity.

Established in 2000, the Mellon Mays Undergraduate Fellowship Program at Emory University is designed to foster and support the vocational commitment of Emory undergraduates who feel called to complete the doctorate in Mellon-designated fields and disciplines, and who feel called to embark upon careers of teaching and research at the college or university level. Created in compliance with the guidelines of the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, Emory's MMUF Program also creates opportunities for undergraduates to undertake research projects in Mellon-designated fields and disciplines in collaboration with Emory faculty members who function as mentors and advisors during the two-year fellowship period. Undergraduates interested in Emory's MMUF Program must:

1. be a rising junior with a minimum GPA of 3.2;
2. be able to demonstrate a commitment to pursue a doctorate in one of the following fields or disciplines: art history, classical studies, English, foreign languages, American and English literature (including area studies), history, musicology, philosophy and religious studies, mathematics, physics, geology and ecology, anthropology, and demography as well as political theory and other fields that employ historical or philosophical methods;
3. have the potential to teach at the college or university level;
4. be a citizen or permanent resident of the United States.

All qualified applicants are eligible to apply. Those from underrepresented minority groups are encouraged to apply. Emory's Mellon Mays Undergraduate Fellows will receive the following benefits:

1. Academic Year Stipend--during the junior and senior years for supervised research with their faculty mentors.
2. Summer Stipends during summers of the junior and senior years up to \$3,000 for supervised research.
3. Participation in "Race and the Academy," the annual summer institute sponsored by the Mellon Foundation, the United Negro College Fund, and Emory's Program of African American Studies.
4. Loan Forgiveness--The Mellon Foundation will repay one-eighth or up to \$1,250 per year of an undergraduate Guaranteed Student Loan for each of the first four years of full-time graduate study for fellows who enroll in doctoral programs in one of the Mellon-designated fields or disciplines no longer than thirty-nine months after receiving the BA degree.
